Program updates

The Manitoba government has announced a major expansion in training capacity at the University of Manitoba's Max Rady College of Medicine, with a focus on increasing the training of family physicians and rebuilding capacity in primary care. The expansion includes increasing the core family medicine residency intake by 30 positions over three years, beginning in July 2023. Additionally, the Medical Licensure Program for International Medical Graduates (MLP-IMG) will be increased by 10 spots over two years, and will move to the Department of Family Medicine by the summer of 2023. The undergraduate medical education program will increase by 40 positions over a couple of years, and the Department of Family Medicine has submitted a plan to expand its Masters of Physician Assistant Studies (MPAS) program. These expansions will require additional training capacity within the university's sites and increased engagement of faculty in on-campus teaching.

Percy E Moore Primary Care and Access Fort Garry Primary Care pilot clinics for the AIM program

In just the first two workshops, teams from both clinics have already started conversations about patient access, identified key areas for improvement, and begun to brainstorm solutions to these challenges. We are excited to see the progress they make as they move through the remaining workshops.

PUBLICATIONS

We are pleased to share the following new publications:

"Evaluation of Base eConsult Manitoba: Patient perspectives on the use of electronic consultation to improve access to specialty advice in Manitoba," released in the journal BMC Health Services Research.

The study, led by Dr. Alex Singer, evaluated the patient experience of Base eConsult Manitoba, an electronic consultation service designed to improve access to specialist advice for primary care providers and their patients.

The study found that patients who used the service were highly satisfied with the timeliness and convenience of receiving specialist advice, as well as the quality of the advice provided. The authors conclude that electronic consultation services like Base eConsult Manitoba have the potential to improve patient care and reduce wait times for specialist appointments.

They also suggest that further research is needed to fully evaluate the impact of these services on patient outcomes and health system costs.

"What is the risk of muscle symptoms on statins?" released in Tools For Practice #334, February 21, 2023.

The authors, Jamie Falk, Allison Paige, and G Michael Allan, found that statins increase the risk of muscle symptoms in their first year of use but are similar to placebo after one year. However, only one in 15 muscle symptom cases are due to the statin.

The study was based on a systematic review of 23 randomized controlled trials with over 154,000 patients and also found that statins may increase muscle symptoms with creatine kinase rise 10x normal for one in ~3000 patients over placebo.

"Intrauterine devices for menorrhagia," released in Canadian Family Physician in February 2023.

The study, conducted by Jen Potter and Adrienne J. Lindblad, explored levonorgestrel-releasing intrauterine systems (LNG-IUS) and their ability to improve outcomes in patients with premenopausal heavy menstrual bleeding with benign cause. The study found that comparing LNG-IUS with other therapies (eg, oral contraceptives [OCs]), blood loss is reduced (by 82% vs 26%), more patients are satisfied (75% vs 60%), and more continue with treatment at 2 years (64% vs 38%).
