What is this project about?

The Department of Family Medicine's long-standing Distributed Education Model (DEM) has successfully supported clinical education across the province for many years. As our needs grow, this model is evolving into a more integrated hub-and-spoke approach creating stronger, more coordinated support between sites while still valuing local strengths and autonomy.

This work focuses on strengthening learning opportunities, enhancing faculty support, simplifying processes, and improving alignment across FM UGME, FM PGME, MPAS, and MLP-IMG programs so that the system continues to serve learners, staff, faculty, and communities sustainably into the future.

This approach builds upon what is already working well, while creating consistency and efficiency across the province.

Why are we doing this?

The government has mandated increased learner seats across all programs to strengthen healthcare access and the future workforce. To support this growth sustainably, we are enhancing our model, processes, and resources.

This allows us to:

- Expand placement capacity while maintaining quality
